The Apostle John writes in 1 John 4:8 "God is Love". This reminds us that love is not just something we do, but something we are meant to live out because we are made in God's image. When Jesus tells us to love one another as He has loved us, He is showing us the divine nature within each of us. Love is a key part of who God is, and we reflect that when we show grace, mercy, forgiveness, compassion and kindness to others.

Relating Scripture to Our Lives and Cultures

The call to love one another goes beyond cultures and countries. In Liberia, a country that has endured civil war and hardship, Christ's love has brought healing. Churches and communities have shown this love by forgiving and coming together, proving that love is stronger than division. During Liberia's reconciliation, Christian leaders encouraged everyone to love as Christ loved us, working for peace and healing. In Canada, a diverse society, Christ's love encourages believers to welcome others, care for newcomers, and serve with humility. This shows how love can bring people together, no matter their difference. Both examples remind us that Christ's love is powerful and can inspire us to be kind, no matter where we come from. The hymn "Heart with Loving Heart" also shares this message, calling us to love sincerely, just as Christ loved us, no matter our background or situation.

Love as a Transformative Power

Nelson Mandela, a visionary leader and thinker, once emphasized that love is the most potent force in the universe because it creates change from within. He argued that love is not merely an emotion but a revolutionary act that challenges systems of oppression and injustice. Mandela believes that when we love authentically, we dismantle walls of separation – whether racial, economic, or social – and foster a community rooted in equality and mutual respect. His words remind us that love is a conscious choice – a daily act of resistance against hatred and fear. As followers of Christ, we are called to mirror this love in our actions, embodying the divine love that Christ exemplified on the cross. Just as Mandela urged us to see love as a tool for social change, Jesus reminds us that love is the mark of discipleship – an unwavering commitment to care for one another beyond superficial gestures.

Love in Action (the Call to Service)

Poet and activist Maya Angelou once proclaimed "Love liberates. It doesn't enslave." Her words remind us that love is an active act of liberation that sets both the lover and the beloved free. Angelou's poetry and life exemplify the transformative power of love – her words inspired generations to see beyond prejudice and to embrace the humanity in every individual. She understood that love in action requires courage, vulnerability, and a willingness to serve. In the context of our faith, this means loving not only in words but in deeds – feeding the hungry, visiting the imprisoned, comforting the broken-hearted, and standing against injustice. As we reflect on Jesus' commandment, let us remember that love is the greatest act of resistance in a world that seeks to divide. When we love as Christ loved – selflessly and sacrificially – we become witnesses to God's kingdom here on earth, shining as lights in dark places.
